#### IN MEMORIAM JUDITH PRICE

Judith Price, who died peacefully at home surrounded by family at the end of September, was Chairman of Wareham Choral Society for 10 years.

Indeed, Judith had been involved in choral singing for most of her life, singing in various local choirs in Purbeck, and co-founding one such singing group, (now sadly defunct).

She was then for some years concert manager for the Dorset Guild of Singers. The Guild was a joint opportunity for several small choirs to join forces and perform choral works beyond the scope of each individual choir and stage a big concert in a large venue such as the concert hall at the Lighthouse in Poole.

As you can imagine, doing this job, as well as singing with your own choir, is an onerous task! Judith managed it, of course, with her customary energy and verve.

Judith then joined Wareham Choral Society, and was invited to become Chairman when the previous Chairman retired.

One particularly noteworthy concert was "Wareham Remembers" in 2014, when we remembered the Wareham men wo lost their lives in World War 1. Some 53 candles, one for each casualty, were sited beneath the window behind the altar, and Judith curated an exhibition in the Parish Hall with local histories and memorabilia from the period.

Judith was an innovative Chairman, and instigated our first Come-and-Sing event, a tradition which still continues.

Judith also started our series of summer concerts in which we sang music in various secular venues, most notably in Tyneham Village, and the Etches Collection Museum at Kimmeridge soon after its opening.

Judith's extensive knowledge of the wider choral repertoire helped us choose secular music to fit the venues.

The first such summer concert was in the Hall at Tyneham Village, which, as you know, belongs to the Army. Two weeks before the concert WCS received an email saying that the Army were withdrawing their permission to use the venue!

While the rest of the committee lapsed into a stunned silence, Judith went on the offensive with both guns blazing. There was only ever going to be one victor in this battle, and it wasn't the Army; the concert went ahead as originally planned.

After 10 years as Chairman, a bout of ill-health meant that Judith had (reluctantly) to retire as Chairman. However, she kept on singing with us.

Unfortunately, recently incipient dementia has meant that she could no longer perform in our concerts. Despite this, she managed to keep singing at our rehearsals, and it is heartening to know that she continued to enjoy singing with us until only a few weeks before her death.

Wareham Choral Society dedicates this concert to Judith's memory, as a fitting tribute to a singer who will be much missed.

# A Season to Sing is Joanna Forbes L'Estrange's largest choral work to date. It



is a choral re-imagining of Vivaldi's violin concerti The Four Seasons, first published 300 years ago. A Season to Sing enhances the music's programmatic intent by weaving into the well-loved melodies texts from poetry and the Bible on the subject of spring, summer, autumn and winter.

**Joanna** is a British vocalist and choral composer whose career began with seven years as music director of the Swingle Singers. Her mission is to create a body of

tuneful, singable, well-crafted music which every choir can enjoy performing.

**Antonio Vivaldi's Gloria** is one of the most enduring choral works of the Baroque era. It showcases the vibrancy and spiritual expressiveness of Vivaldi's sacred style. It was composed around 1715, during Vivaldi's time at the Ospedale della Pietà in Venice, an institution for orphaned and illegitimate girls where Vivaldi served as music director.

The Gloria is set in twelve short movements, and is a joyful and richly varied setting of the traditional Latin Mass text, from the radiant opening "Gloria in Excelsis Deo" to the contemplative "Domine Deus" and the exuberant final "Cum Sancto Spiritu", Vivaldi alternates between full choral splendour and intimate solo passages. The work demonstrates his gift for melody, dramatic contrasts, and rhythmic vitality, all hallmarks of the Venetian Baroque.

**Antonio Lucio Vivaldi** (1678 –1741) was an Italian composer, violinist, impresario of Baroque music and Roman Catholic priest.

His influence during his lifetime was widespread across Europe, giving rise to many imitators and admirers.

Vivaldi composed many instrumental concerti, for the violin and other instruments, as well as sacred choral works and more than fifty operas.

His best-known work is, of course, *The Four Seasons*, which forms the basis of *A Season to Sing*, but we shall also hear 2 pieces from our string quartet this evening.

Hazel Ricketts studied music at the University of Surrey, with piano as her first instrument, and gained her MA in Musicology from the University of Southampton. She has sung in choirs since the age of 6, and started accompanying them and leading occasional rehearsals at the age of 14. During her



MA she was appointed Director of Music at Holy Trinity Church in Fareham, and has been regularly conducting choirs ever since.

She also plays the clarinet, and in recent years has rediscovered the organ – most recently studying with John Challenger (Salisbury Cathedral). She has been Musical Director of Wareham Choral Society since 2018. She is also co-Director of Music at St Mary's Church Fordingbridge where she both plays the organ and conducts the choir, as well as making musical links beyond the church.

Paul Ellis (organ) studied at Manchester University and the Royal Northern



College of Music, where his tutors included Gillian Weir (organ) and Robert Elliott (harpsichord). He is an experienced organ recitalist, giving performances across the UK and in the USA and in Paris, along with regular recitals in Sherborne Abbey. Paul developed a love of choral music whilst at university and has conducted choirs ever since. He has worked with many

choirs in the South West and earned a reputation for high standards of performance and innovative programming. Choirs with which Paul has worked over the years include the Grange Choral Society, Taunton Camerata, Sherborne School Music Society and East Cornwall Bach Choir.

**Beatrice Maloney (soprano)** has sung all her life and started her formal musical education through Salisbury Cathedral as a girl chorister

. She continued to pursue singing through school and university with choral scholarships, and singing in local choirs including a quartet called "The Collared Doves" which raised money for local churches in Oxfordshire.

Her vocation is with animals, originally in equine science and equitation, she still has horses, sheep and cattle out on the New Forest but now works as a local vet for companion animals.

Beatrice is once again singing regularly at Salisbury
Cathedral as a member of the Cathedral Chamber Choir.
She is most at home with religious works where she can be an instrument of prayer and she finds singing her most expressive.

Salisbury, where she was part of the a capella choir under Elizabeth Poppleton and later Chris Fay. Mariah went on to become the music prefect, and in 2023 won the David Spencer prize for Vocal Studies. She has since performed solos in Mozart's Coronation Mass, Schubert's Mass in G, and Britten's Ceremony of Carols. As part of Salisbury Cathedral Chamber Choir, Mariah can often be found singing

evensong. Mariah balances her love of music with a career in accountancy.
